We are a non-maintained special school for young people aged 2-19



Currently we have 22 girls and 20 boys



Our Local Authority is Surrey, but we do work with 17 LAs across South East England



All our children have complex Education Health Therapy and Care needs resulting in multiple barriers to learning







We have great staff – we are all Leaders of Learning



Learning and Teaching





We looked again at how we teach children with complex needs (PMLD), especially about how they see the world.

We learned more about the things that can make it hard for them to use their vision, and found ways to help them see and learn better.



Teachers from other schools came to visit us. We went to them. We watched lessons and talked to share good ideas and make learning even better for children with sensory needs.



A school improvement expert said:

Leadership and Management





We have two Headteachers working together.

They help lead the school by using their different skills to make things better.




We've made our systems smarter.

We started using tools like SchoolIP and Teams to help staff talk to each other more easily and get things done faster.



Our training day helped us think about what "excellence" means in our school.

These updates help more people learn about our school and how great it is.



Assessment Achievement and progress



Some of our young people earned special awards in music and life skills.

They got Trinity music certificates and ASDAN qualifications, showing what they can do and helping them grow their talents.



We celebrated graduations with families.

These were happy moments where we cheered for our students and their amazing achievements.



We worked with local councils on 38 special support plans (EHCPs).

We updated 20 plans and helped 2 children get new ones, making sure they get the right help for learning and growing.

Behaviour and attitudes





Whole School Attendance: 82.34%

This means most children came to school regularly and on time, we are working to help even more children come every day.



Staff training helped us learn how to support people who are sad after someone dies. We learned how to spot signs of grief and how to help children, families, and each other with kindness and care.



All children now use Zones of Regulation.

This helps everyone understand their feelings and learn ways to stay calm, focused, and ready to learn.



Early Years





We made the early years playground better! It's now a fun, safe place where children can play and learn at the same time.



Families from our Taddies playgroup are now connected to ClassDojo. This means they can see and enjoy the sensory activities their children do, helping with early learning.



Some children moved on to new schools. Their next steps are at Woodlands and Brooklands.



Music for engagement





We helped with a university research project!

One of our team gave advice to the University of Roehampton about a special music device called MOGU, which helps make music more accessible.

We shared our ideas and followed the SOI (Sounds of Intent) framework to help them make music more inclusive and fun.



Personal development





We took part in the Liberation Art Festival 2025! It celebrated every child's right to play, be creative, and enjoy art and culture. Everyone had a chance to join in.



Our school now has a special Sensory Careers Event every year. It helps children use what they've learned in real-life situations, like jobs and activities they might do when they're older.



Fun activities help build confidence and excitement.

From winning money through our ECO project to joining in with sensory circus workshops and play, enrichment makes learning even more fun!

Physical health and activity



We created a special sensory space for our learners.

It's used for calming activities like yoga and one-to-one music therapy, helping children feel safe and supported.



We're exploring inclusive dance.

This means everyone can join in, no matter their abilities. We're helping with new research called Moves of Intent.



The Innowalk is now even more exciting!

With cool projected images, it feels like walking through space, a garden, or a town—making movement fun and magical.
